Homily for June 26, 2011 Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ  
(Deuteronomy 8:2-16a, 1 Corinthians 10:16-17, John 6:51-59)

## A MESSAGE FROM YOUR PASTOR

Dear People of St. Thomas More,

Catholics have often been criticized for not being biblical. But the feast we celebrate today is very biblical and the passages where it's mentioned are central to the life of the Church and Christianity and to understanding not only the gospels but even Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. In Corinthians Paul makes several references; in today's passage Paul, the first Christian writer, points out that Jesus (the Risen Lord) is present in the Bread and Wine—it is His Body—His Blood. (1 Cor. 10:16-17) In the next chapter Paul claims that what he is handing on to us he has received from the Lord personally. (1Cor. 11:23) The belief that Jesus the Risen Lord is really present in the Eucharistic bread and wine is reflected in the gospels' writers, the next generations of Christians. Matthew and Luke, following Mark, describe the Last Supper in the gospels as a summation of Jesus' ministry and as an explanation of His coming suffering, death and resurrection. The gospel of John that we heard today, is a Eucharistic gospel, loaded with symbols that point to the Risen Lord as being present in the Bread and Wine.

**Point One:** In today's passage, Jesus, the Risen Lord, (which is the way John's gospel depicts Jesus,) is telling us: "the bread that I will give is my flesh....my blood real drink (wine) John 6:51-58

**Point Two:** When we think of the Body and Blood of Jesus, think of this: By eating the Body of Christ and drinking His Blood, we become the Body of Christ. St. Paul is saying that we become the Church. So think of all those people who share the faith with you—now think of all those who shared the faith with them, and so on—as the line goes back to St. Paul. By eating Jesus' flesh and drinking His blood, we become part of His body—the Church through the Ages—the Eternal Church.

**Point Three:** Not only are the passages referring to the real presence in the Bible, but the belief is held from the very beginning in the practice of Christianity and in the Church's worship.

**Point Four:** This is what I call the message. All of us expect life to be easy, a bed of roses, a walk in the park, a bowl of cherries without the pits. I mean, when did you get irritated this week because things did not go smoothly? The message of the Body and Blood of Christ is multifold—but think of this—Jesus connects the ideas of Life, Love and sacrifice—it explains His life should explain ours. We are told to love God, our neighbor and ourselves.

Now let's start with loving ourselves—in our Christian life, self-love is not self-indulgence. Love of self would mean giving up, sacrificing that which is self-destructive in ourselves so we might grow—blossom. Self love means self-improvement.

For seven years, one or two days a week, I did counseling with over 110 inmates. At that time 86% were addicted. So self-love calls for the sacrificing of the thing one is addicted to, and the lifestyle. Now our "drug of choice" could be something else besides a chemical substance—anything that we habitually use to self-defeat or damage ourselves. If our self-love causes us to have a greater life, it will prepare us to better love others and eventually God. Think about it, as one loves in marriage, how many times does one sacrifice for the other? And if we are practiced in love of self, love of the spouse, are we in a better position to parent—love children?

Next point, as we sacrifice, we add our sacrifice to Christ in the Eucharist and by loving, sacrificing, we open ourselves to the God who is able to work through us. The point being, God has operated through how many others to bless our lives—how many sacrifices? So we need to be Thankful for all that God has given us through the sacrifice of others...

**CHALLENGE TO CHANGE**

*At this time of the year it is easy to see today’s Gospel in practice. Farmers and gardeners sowed, weeded, fertilized, and watered, and now begin to see the fruits of their labor. They sowed more seed than they actually needed, as nature is generous but also wasteful: no one who grows plants can tell you how many will survive and produce seed of their own. The parable of the sower, like all Jesus’ parables, stands conventional wisdom on its head and offers layers of new meaning. In Jesus’ day, the way of righteousness was spelled out in the Jewish scriptures. The person who lived as a pious Jew, following the Law of Moses, could be assured of many blessings. Yet, as Jesus often demonstrated, following the rules and living the life are not the same thing. Why does the seed of the word not bear fruit in everyone who hears it? Jesus quotes the prophet Isaiah, who describes people as dull of hearing with their eyes shut. Jesus explains this as a form of self-protection. If people really hear and really see, they might have to change. We may hear this Gospel with a hint of complacency. It is possible to hear this parable and enjoy it as a simple tale. After all, we understand it, and we are not like the rest. But is this true? Do we really hear the word? Are we really seeking its meaning for us? Do we allow it to take root in the good soil in our lives, or do we push it to the edges or let it get choked out by other priorities? Disciples are the ones who water and nurture it, and ask Jesus to help them produce abundant fruit.*

**Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time  
Rich Soil**

The first reading reminds me of an echo canyon: a place where you can yell, "Hello!" and hear it bounce back to you. Normally after the echoes die down, you just hear nothing; no one else yells back to you. But God says his word is different. Like rain or snow, it doesn't just bounce back. The rain waters the ground, allowing crops to grow. God's word doesn't come back empty-handed like an echo. It takes root in the soul and changes people. But before you water the crops, you must sow the seeds.

You might think that Jesus in the gospel today sounds discouraged. His parable has most of the seed falling where it never produces much fruit. When the disciples ask why he teaches with parables, he quotes Isaiah about people who hear God's word, but don't understand, or even listen. Most likely, Jesus wasn't the one who was discouraged. His disciples had probably had the same experience, of preaching to deaf ears.

That is why the punch line of the parable is that the seed on rich soil produces so much fruit. The point is that no matter how much seed appears to be wasted, the final result is still 30, 60, or even 100 times as much fruit—More than enough to make up for the ones that never made it. Jesus is answering the most common excuse for not spreading the good news: "Most people don't get the message." He knows that many will not listen, or change their minds, or not follow through. Jesus would say, "So what? Don't let that stop you. If one person hears the good news, and starts living that way, who knows who many people will be touched by it."

Our culture makes it difficult, or at least uncomfortable to spread the good news. We're told not to discuss religion or politics at social gatherings. Kids in public schools can't even mention religious holidays. Today's gospel tells us that these are just excuses. There are many ways to spread the seeds of faith. Your parish or diocese will have suggestions about feeding the poor, instructing converts, being a confirmation sponsor, assisting the elderly or disabled.
