3rd Sunday of Lent

Dear People of St. Thomas More,

I started to grade school at St. Mark's on the south side of Indianapolis in the fall of 1955. About 15 years ago I was having dinner at some people's house and the man, Mick, mentioned that he had also gone to St. Mark's—about 4 years earlier. And he mentioned that while he was in 8th grade he and his buddies would trade knives and long guns on the playground and they kept them in the back of the classroom. After school he'd walk home and hunt rabbits on the railroad tracks. Far cry from today isn't it? when a 15 year old boy brings a gun to shoot another student at Martinsville middle school.

So this Lent, when we are journeying, what should we make of this? I have heard that the one boy lived with his mother in a trailer park. Maybe if journeying is one of our symbols as a parish for Lent, we should consider that every human being needs to be loved. In the earlier 1700s, during what was called the age of Enlightenment, there was a European king who thought there had to be a better way to raise children—a way without the confusion and trouble of emotions. So I think he started with orphanages. The buildings were nice and clean; the children were fed and changed; they were warm and dry. But they were not handled or kissed or played with. The infants failed to thrive; they started to die. Touch, particularly touch with infants, builds relationships and eventually connects the child with other people. Many of our problem people come from homes where that love was not present.

In the 1950s there was psychologist named John Broadus Watson (1878-1958) who thought that it was weakness to show emotion, so he “raised” his children in what he hoped was a “modern” way, without emotions, without touch. One of his sons committed suicide and his daughter was in treatment most of her adult life for suicidal depression. One point for our journey this week might be that all human beings need the experience of being loved, particularly from birth on. We need to learn how to give it and receive it. If we are going to talk about what people need to do besides giving and receiving care and concern, people need to learn. Think of infants—they are born without knowing a vocabulary or grammar. Yet if you talk to a baby daily—by the time the child is 3, he or she can be a very good conversationalist, can't they?? You know a few. Now we live in a culture that has things like cell phones, personal computers, things we never dreamed of in the 1950s. To maintain this level of ease, this level of advancement, we need learned people—we need people willing to learn all through life. The boy who brought the gun to school Friday didn't come to learn; he probably hadn't come to school to learn for some time. Ignorance will be as damaging as maliciousness in this technological age we live in. Playing violent video games doesn't cause shootings, but it doesn't help learning either.

Today we heard the story of Moses striking the rock so the Israelites could drink. Jesus' discussion with the woman at the well is about water to drink as well. In both stories, the water turns from being a tale of drinking water to being a person of faith. Moses and the Israelites have to have faith that God will provide. In the gospel, the spiritual water is faith that Jesus is the Messiah, the Savior.

In closing, maybe we might think about how, if the shooter was a person of faith, he would not have resorted to taking a gun to school. Maybe we ought to think that if we want a more peaceful world, we need to reach out to those who don't believe and help them come to faith.

The poisonous snake, called evil, that is on our paths, would like us to believe that we can do nothing about violence in our families, communities, world. Today, this week, let's drink deeply from our living water of faith and journey in such a way that the people we meet are left with a better understanding of love and a greater desire to learn.

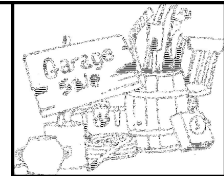

**Fifth Sunday Of Lent**

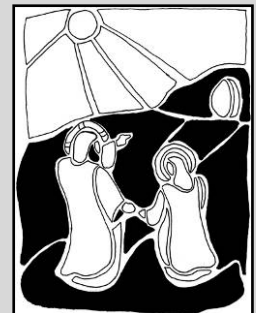
**Grateful Dead**

In these last few weeks of lent, we have seen how Jesus is a forgiving Savior for the woman at the well, the light of the world for the blind man, and now the giver of life, for Lazarus. In the previous gospels, the central character grows in faith. But Lazarus is not the one whose faith is stretched. Martha and Mary both come to see what Jesus can do for their brother. And both come to believe that Jesus is Life.

Jesus explains this in two ways. First, he says the believer who dies will live. That is the more obvious description of resurrection, or new life. We look forward to the resurrection after our physical life is over. It gives meaning to life in that we have a goal that is greater than anything on earth, and we can face our own death peacefully. It reminds us how much God loves us that he would send his son to die and rise for us. So does that mean this life is not so important?

Jesus answers that with his second explanation when he says the one who lives and believes in him will never die. This time he is referring to death of the soul, or sin. He means that if we truly believe in him we will never suffer the permanent death of sin. We will seek and accept his forgiveness when we sin. And we will be less likely to sin, the more we live for him. The deeper our faith, the more free from selfishness, fear, and hatred we become. This freedom is symbolized by the Lord's command to untie Lazarus and let him go. It also gives a new meaning to life: We live now in service to the Lord and each other.

Let us encourage and pray for those preparing for Baptism on Easter. As we have learned to die to our sins and live for the Lord, they are beginning to take up their crosses and follow Jesus to new life. May they use the remaining two weeks to prayerfully strengthen their faith in the One who gives Life.
