Dear People of St. Thomas More,

When we talk about God we are talking about a mystery—human language can't fully convey the mystery. So, that being said, when Christians talk about the Trinity, 3 persons and 1 God, we have a problem with words as well as the mystery. Maybe it would help to say that the word "person" is being used in an ancient Greek philosophical way—meaning something capable of keeping itself in existence....sounds good—but note the subtlety—keeping itself in existence—nothing can take away its existence—no accident or disease. It, itself is the source of its own existence—something humans are not. When we think of person, today we think in terms of psychology—personality, unique face—that is not what is meant by the Creed, 3 persons, 1 God.

Now when the ancient Hebrews talked about God, one of the main ideas was that God is the Creator. Unlike the pagan gods who were part of the creation, the Jewish idea is that God is outside creation. He is other than His creation; He is before it in time. Not only is He outside creation, but God holds His creation in existence...creation is not a one time thing—God is keeping everything in existence. Tonight, watch the stars; we can see about 10,000 stars. That's a small part of the nearly billion stars in our galaxy, the Milky Way. Now think of a billion (roughly) galaxies in this creation and you get an idea of the almightiness of God.

The ancient Jews talked about God, the creator, who was outside His creation. How did they talk about God being close to us in His creation? When I was a child my mother had a Christmas decoration that was brass—it had 4 angels with rods hanging from them and a bell below the angels. The stand held 4 candles, which when lit moved a fan with the rising heat, and the rods from the angels struck the bell as the angels went around. My mother didn't believe in fire and me being in the house together, so I soon realized that the angels would turn and ring the bell if one blew gently on the fan. In the Old Testament, the word for spirit is first the same word for breath or wind. The word picture becomes God breathing into His creation first in the 2nd creation account- He had molded the body of the earthling out of the clay of the earth and then God breathed into the form the "Breath of Life."

This Breath of God doesn't stop with causing life. The ancient prophets received the Breath of God—it caused them to preach the Truth to the community even when the community did not want to hear it. The Breath of God is also the Spirit of wisdom. King David had the Breath of God flow over him—and most of his decisions were good, making David the greatest of Jewish kings. The Breath or Spirit of God is how God the other, outside of His creation, gets close to us inside His creation.

It is on this foundation of God and His breath that the gospel of John builds. The gospel is written about 70 years after the death of Jesus and the gospel writer wants to explain Jesus' relationship to God, God the Creator. In the beginning was the "Word"....think of the 6 commands in the first creation story—"Let there be..." John's gospel uses the Greek "Logos" which means word, but it can also express "plan" like we might say "blueprint" or the word "concept." So the God Creator whose Breath moves in creation causes order like Life, Truth, Wisdom—has a "Plan", a "Concept", "Blueprint", "Word", Jesus. Jesus is the Word of God—the "Blueprint" of God, especially for humanity. Jesus' preaching and His actions are part of the plan of God for all humans. This plan includes resurrection.

The ancient pagans and especially the Jews of the apostles' time, criticized Christianity for having 3 gods, not one. St. Augustine, in about 400 AD, explained how there are 3 in 1. We all have awareness—in the morning when we wake up—it increases—1st we're aware of the time, where we are, what we need to do—after a bit we become aware of our self image, maybe when we look in the bathroom mirror. And if we were to write out a description of our self image it would probably take several volumes. And if we are healthy, that awareness would not only think of the self image but have an emotional response. St. Augustine speaks of Will. Awareness, self image (concept), response—3 in 1. Father, the origin-source, Son, the self concept or plan, Spirit, love-will—3 persons in one God.

Today, this week, ponder the awesomeness of God the Creator, the closeness of the Spirit of God in life, truth, wisdom, love and the plan of God—Jesus the Son, so that maybe this God can give you hope, strengthen your faith and love.

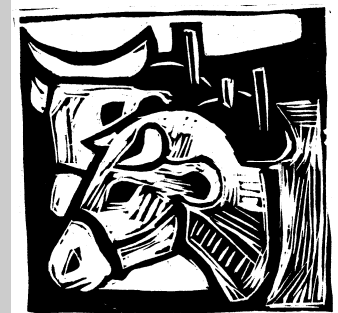

SIDE BY SIDE

“Come to me, all you who labor” (Matthew 11:28). When we are overburdened, weary, confused, or sick, Jesus’ invitation sounds like music to our ears. Other people seem to be so much better at coping than we are, and we wonder what their secret is. The promise of rest in Jesus seems very sweet, except for a small complication. Jesus says, “Take my yoke upon you” (Matthew 11:29). How does this give rest to our souls? In another Gospel narrative, Jesus rebukes the Pharisees for laying burdensome religious regulations on people’s backs and not lifting a finger to help them carry the load. Jesus does not weigh his disciples down with teaching that they cannot follow. Jesus invites them to shoulder his yoke and learn from him, for he is gentle and humble of heart. For generations farmers have yoked a young and inexperienced plough animal alongside one that is well trained. The more experienced animal trains the other by example; the novice gradually learns how to work until it can manage alone. An older animal near the end of its working life may likewise be yoked to one in its prime, so that the strain of the hardest work is taken by the stronger partner. So too with us. Jesus invites us to take on his yoke so he can teach us, not by laying burdens upon us, but by walking alongside us and helping us to do things his way. He promised never to leave us to “pull” alone. When it all gets too much or we lose our way, he will be there alongside us again—gentle, humble, but infinitely powerful and wise. At times when we are strong we in turn can yoke ourselves to someone who needs that extra pull to get to firmer ground.

**Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time
Father and Son**

Usually, we talk about the second part of the gospel. It's very comforting, promising rest to those who labor and a light burden for those who take Jesus' yoke, that is, are willing to be led by Jesus. But let's look at the first half of the passage. It almost sounds like a riddle with mysterious phrases. So what is Jesus saying?

First he talks about the Father hiding things "from the wise and the learned." Some people think they know everything. They look down at people who have faith in Jesus as if they were simpletons. They usually say that faith is a way of hiding from reality; that only scientifically proven things are real. While people who think this way may be kind and generous, they are missing the deeper meaning of life. Jesus says that those hidden meanings are revealed to the "little ones," those with a child-like ability to believe without proof, just because God tells them. These are the ones he talks about in the Beatitudes: "Blessed are the poor in spirit...blessed are the meek." (Mt 5:3, 5)

If you want the kind of faith Jesus is talking about, you have to be open to it. You have to be willing to see the world through the eyes of faith. Do you expect to see Jesus in the people you will talk to today? Do you listen to the scripture readings for how they can apply to you? Are you willing to accept the frustrations of life, or the mistakes you make, as opportunities to experience God's love and/or forgiveness?

The second saying is about knowing the Father through the Son. We could know little or nothing about God by ourselves. But the love God has for us can only be known if he reveals it. The Father and Son are one God; they never act separately or hide anything from each other. But we may be hiding from God. If we have sinned and are afraid to confess it to God, we are missing a chance to experience God's love when he forgives us. Remember, Jesus did the hard part by dying for our sins.
