Homily for July 17, 2011 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12, Romans 8:28-30, Mt 13:44-52

Dear People of St. Thomas More,

We know that these parables of the wheat field with weeds, and the one about the mustard seed are not about farming, but on one level about the Church (Kingdom of God).

The parable of the wheat field with weeds probably leaves us wondering. It's based on the fact that wheat has never been planted in rows, like corn or beans—when you see a corn field or a soybean field you see rows with enough space to walk in between the crops. In a wheat field there are no rows; wheat is planted so one plant is right next to its neighbor. So if you had to walk to the weed to pull it, you would be walking on the wheat, and if you pulled the weed up, that would uproot the wheat next to it. So do you still wonder why the parable? The parable is talking about not purging members of the community who might be problematic.... hmm— You think so?

I just finished a book—took me a year to read because I did not like the information, but the book will emphasize the message of the parable—the book is Stalin and the Court of the Red Tsar. Stalin was the communist dictator of Russia from 1924 to his death in 1953. To strengthen his hold on Russia, Stalin “weeded” Russians in the 1930s and started to again in 1951-53 before he died. The historian's estimates are that he had killed between 16 and 20 million people, with 20 million thought to be the more accurate estimate. This was before WWII. It is also thought that he ordered the displacement of some 28 million ethnic people because he thought they would aid the Nazis during the war. The secret police simply loaded whole groups of small nations on trains and moved them 1,000 miles away. By his death, Stalin had 18 million in his concentration camps. Stalin has been dead 50 some years and Russia is still suffering from his “weed pulling” and will probably continue to suffer for some time to come.

Philosophical ideas behind the parable for us:

1. Evil is real—and it damages persons and community...there are “weeds.” We should remember, however, that evil is parasitical—think leech-like—St. Augustine said dependent. Example: you can have life (a good) without murder...you can have property (another good) without theft. But you can't have murder (or evil) without life. Try imagining murder without life or theft without property.
2. That being said—we need to know that there is no perfect world, no perfect society. In our world today, with the seemingly unresolvable conflicts, suddenly this parable of the wheat field takes on huge importance. Too many are willing to be “Cain” to their ‘brothers.’ Stalin argued that the people he was killing were “weeds” keeping the perfect society from developing; hence they needed to be killed.

So what can we say? All human evil is based on a lie. Yet there have always been people who turned to evil—before Jesus' day and up to now. There will be no perfect world, no perfect society. There are people like Stalin willing to suggest that the wheat field needs to be weeded. Stop and listen. So what does the parable say—extermination is not an option.

Like the wheat field, the next two parables are about the Church. Think of the mustard seed—a small seed becomes a large plant—the Church began as 11 apostles and maybe 500 disciples—small seed in the Roman Empire of several million people. 20 centuries later the Catholic Church, Roman and other types, now number over 1 billion people—out of 7 billion people alive today. The “birds” of the air come and dwell in its branches. All the nations of Europe have benefited from 1,500 plus years of church schools, universities—even draining of marshes and like projects. The birds are the nations—the church the mustard bush.

Now think of the yeast—3 measures—means the woman might have been a baker. You start by mixing the yeast with water and sugar, then add flour. Think of the yeast spreading through all the dough; the yeast creates little bubbles in the bread.

Now think of how our Christianity affects the world culture. Do you believe in the value of human life? God created humans in His own image—think of human rights, of being a good Samaritan—people who aren't Christian are affected—sharing the ideas—our faith affecting the whole world. Yeast and flour.

Today, this week, think about these mind teasers, these parables: the wheat field, the mustard seed, the yeast—and ask—how are you going to be part of Christ's church, dealing with the wheat field, being a 2000 year old mustard plant that started from such a small seed. Think about the yeast and how we can affect the world's thinking.

PREPARING FOR THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

What Is a Roman Missal?

On the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, Catholic parishes in the United States will begin praying the texts of the Mass using a new English translation of *The Roman Missal*. *The Roman Missal* contains what the Church refers to as the “proper” antiphons for entrance and Communion time (in the United States, with the approval of our bishops, we commonly substitute hymns and songs for these “proper” antiphons). The Missal also contains prayers such as the Sign of the Cross and the greetings used at Mass. The opening prayer or Collect, the prayer over the bread and wine at the preparation of the gifts, and the Prayer after Communion are all found in the Missal, as are the different Eucharistic Prayers that are used at Mass and the blessings at the end of the liturgy. The Missal also contains all of the parts of the Mass that the people say or sing, such as the “I confess,” the Gloria, the Creed, the Lord’s Prayer, the Lamb of God, and our other responses. Some of these prayers are changed with the new translation; others remain the same.

Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Counting Loaves

Usually, Jesus does not have to repeat himself. When he tells a cripple to get up and walk, or a blind man to wash his eyes, they do so and are immediately cured. In today's gospel, however, the disciples do not drop everything to start feeding the crowd. Instead of trusting Jesus, they start counting loaves of bread. (Note that the crowd does not hesitate to sit down when Jesus tells them to.) After Jesus blesses the loaves and fish, the disciples finally obey.

Like the disciples, I sometimes hesitate to follow Jesus' commands. Instead of trusting God completely, I find myself "counting loaves." I might not have enough time to help the poor, or enough money to feed them. I might not have the words to comfort the dying, or to encourage someone who is depressed. I may be counting the chores I have to do at home. (Or counting the episodes of "Doctor Who" on my DVR that I haven't watched yet.)

The excuses begin to sound lame when I list them. So how do we get going? Maybe by listening to the first two readings. Isaiah asks why we spend money on things that won't satisfy us. (Is 55:2) He tells us to heed the Lord's words if we want to truly live. What God is telling us through Isaiah is that we wouldn't be distracted by those excuses if we paid more attention to God and how much He loves us.

St. Paul says it even more forcefully. He reminds us that nothing can separate us from God's love, even things like distress, persecution, famine, or even death itself. These are more serious than any of my excuses. The point is that Jesus rose from the dead to show how much God loves us. Can't I find time to spend with God and experience that love? Can't I see it in the eyes of those who love me? Do I feel that love when God forgives my sins?
